Nick Turley, Chairman of Post War Austin 7's and organising Chairman of the centenary celebrations which saw 1400 cars converge on Morton-on-Marsh, Peter Rowlands who contacted us to tell us of their upcoming visit, Sue Turley, Sue Rowlands and Margaret Matthews. They arrived in Perth to the prospect of a 43 degree day for our much anticipated Meet and Greet and a hot week for the remainder of their visit.

Phew!!! This weather was almost too hot for the locals and their little old cars, let alone the international travellers. However, not to be beaten by the weather the plans were adapted to meeting at the hotel, assessing the weather for the possibility

of having a ride in the little cars, and of course having a good old chinwag about all sort of things, including Austin 7s.

Six Austin 7's lined up under the *porte cochere* in front of the Pan Pacific Hotel where the concierge and car valet made sure they were well displayed and out of the way of the guests coming and going. The temperature did hit 43 degrees later in the day, and at 7.30 pm it was still 38.8 degrees. A warm welcome for our UK visitors!



# Caveat - Core Plug Calamities can create Oil Pressure Gauge Reading Problems

The rear cylinder head top core plug started leaking a year ago, so I bogged it, the leak stopped, and I ordered 3 core plugs from UK on-line, which arrived. Then this morning, the radiator water check revealed lots of water missing – the forward core plug also was perforated, water running aft on the head and overflowing everywhere, particularly noticed above the oil level dipstick. I dug out the old two core plug caps and replaced with the new. All OK. The third core plug cap on the carburetor side looks OK. I removed the threaded stem from an Austin 7 hub remover tool and used that in combination with a large hammer to seat the caps with one pelt (a Scottish word for hit). I used a silicon hardening agent to help the seal. All good so far! The below left diagram shows the pump suction from the lowest point in the sump, distribution oil to the camshaft bearing, gallery and the oil indicator'





I found on starting ZERO oil pressure, although the engine sounded as sweet as ever. Switched off and checked dipstick- oil level OK, Removed the 'connection to indicator' leaving the spigot visible to check the oil outflow from the pump and restarted the motor. To my surprise water was gurgling and ebbing slightly from the oil delivery spigot – then it struck me, (like it would for a promising Tool of the Month candidate) the water leaking from the core plugs would have trickled down the oil dipstick aperture, and found its way (water is heavier than oil) to the lowest point in the crankcase being the submerged suction inlet for the mechanically driven vane oil pump. (see picture above right, the new caps in red and the oil dipstick next to the oil indicator connection above).

With some excitement, I started the motor again and to my delight, black oil was gushing from the spigot, so I immediately switched off, reconnected the oil indicator and restarted the motor – max 6 psi on the scale! I was somewhat relieved with this successful repair and diagnosis of the water entry into the crankcase. I then drained the old black oil, which will be recycled via Swanbourne garage, and refilled the sump with new oil. There were some traces of water in the old oil, so it is a good thing to change oil if it is contaminated with water.


#### Alternative "Tool of the Month"



#### **AUSTRALIAN-BODIED AUSTIN SEVENS**

In the aftermath of World War I the Australian Government imposed a tariff on imported vehicles, with tax concessions applying to rolling chassis, as a stimulus to develop a sovereign motor vehicle industry. The chassis concession acted as a financial incentive for local coach-builders to import factory built rolling chassis, and fit uniquely Australian designed and built bodies, leading to the establishment of an Australian motor vehicle bodybuilding industry in the early 1920s.

The largest and best known of these Australian coach-builders was <u>Holden's Motor Body Builders</u>. Holden built Australian-bodied Austin Seven tourer and roadster models from the mid-1920s.

However, several smaller coach-builders built limited numbers of Australian-bodied Austin Seven sports models between 1924 and 1934. Some examples of these Australian-bodied sports models are; the Standard Sports, built by Flood Motor Body Works, St Kilda Road, Melbourne; the Wasp built by William Green, Parramatta Road, Petersham, Sydney; the Moth built by Geo Sykes, Gordon Road, Chatswood, Sydney; the Comet built by Bill Conoulty, Sydney; and the Meteor. The Meteor was built by several coach-builders (Flood Motor Body Works, St Kilda Road, Melbourne; Jack Lonzar, Kent Town Adelaide; and A Robinson & Co., 181 Castlereagh St, Sydney), with individual variations to the common design

# Perth's 'king' of the used car dealers

In an industry which was the crucible of the "gimmick salesman," Ben Mainstone was one-in-a-million.

A Perth boy, he went into the used car business in 1953 "on a whim". But he had a canny knack for promotion and a flair for the unusual.

At a time when, he recalls, nobody else in the used car business was doing anything, Ben Mainstone turned Perth upside down.

He sold cars for 2/6 (25c), 3/11 (39c) and 18/6 (\$1.85). He even listed cars as free -- but the battery cost 12/6 (\$1.25)!

His business went like wildfire. People turned up in their hundreds to his sales, waiting patiently for hours to have their name drawn from a hat for the privilege of snapping up the bargains.

At his yard in Canning Highway, Como, traffic police were needed to control the crowds.

His speciality was 1920s cars -- and in the 1950s he was still trading cars up to 30 years old. The love affair has lasted, as he is still a member of the W.A. Veteran and Vintage Car Club.


Garvey Park is located at the river end of Fauntleroy Avenue in Ascot. The remnant vegetation in the park is of high conservation value.
