

Secretary's Notes



Much has been written over the last few years about the imminent demise of the Internal Combustion Engine, but in fact, there is nothing basically wrong with the I.C.E, it is the fuel, both petrol and diesel, that causes all the problems. There is a Devon based business which is addressing this issue and has produced an Ammonia based substitute fuel. Apparently, in initial trials, this has proved to be a viable alternative with no negative emissions, and it is hoped that production can be scaled up to a commercial level over the next 5 years. I'm not sure if it is this Ammonia based Fuel that will be used, but it has recently been announced that the 2024 Goodwood Revival will require all vehicles to be powered by sustainable fuel, so watch this space. There might just be an alternative to EV's on the horizon.

Sump Reinforcing strips.



Following the publication of the photos of my sump reinforcing strips in last month's David's Diary, I was contacted by Eddie Loader, the Technical Advisor for the Hereford A7 Club. He told me that he designed and manufactured these items and sold them at his stall at the Beaulieu A7 autojumble some 10 years ago. He apparently made just 5 sets and sold them for £15. each, all 5 sets selling very quickly. Was I one of his 5 customers or did I acquire them from someone else later? I really can't remember!!

Eddie added that he designed this reinforcing medium to obviously help in obtaining a sump joint free from leakage, but also had a theory that the design would make the whole lower Crankcase stronger, this being particularly beneficial to 3 bearing crankcases.

His original idea for developing the strips was to improve on Austin's design which, when the sump was new, worked reasonably well at keeping the engine oil captive. However, the problem is the very thin gauge of steel used in the sump

pressing, resulted after a short period of time, in a distorted mating face, which of course made it difficult to keep the joint oil tight

Eddie said that he often wondered why Austin used such light gauge steel in their sump pressing, and came to the conclusion that it was to reduce production costs and also to reduce the overall engine weight. Of course, there was a hidden benefit from the constant sump leaks, which was when the vehicle was in motion the leaked oil sprayed the car chassis and floor pan, resulting in an efficient underseal medium.

Eddie does not lay claim to the originality of this modification. He told me that he first observed that Vauxhall used a reinforcing medium on the sumps of their front wheel drive engine units.

For interest, he did look into the possibility of having the strips cut in one piece by the Laser process, but the cost was horrendous due to material wastage.

Thank you Eddie for the additional information.

What better way to spend a dreary winter's evening than to close the curtains, pour a warming drink and spend an hour chatting to fellow DA7C members.



This money is raised by the purchase by drivers and riders of a fundraising 'Drive it Day' rally plaque. It's an easy way for drivers and riders to show their support, and donate vital funds.



A7 Registration. PG 400

Through negligence, ignorance, forgetfulness and preoccupation with living, I allowed the DVLA registration of my 1929 Chummy to lapse when I laid her up 20 years ago.

After 30 years regular use I put her on blocks in a dry garage, occasionally lifted the cover to make sure the mice had not eaten the seats and forgot about her.

If in any doubt about registration, owners should read the plentiful advice on the DVLA web sites. Essentially, a vehicle first registered prior to 1.1.83 is exempt from paying road tax but, most important, must still register with the DVLA and if not used on the road must still SORN it - Statuary Off Road Notification. For all the reasons above I neglected to do either.

In order to revive a lapsed or lost registration a vehicle must have a V5, the old fold-out buff document we all used to have. Hopefully an unregistered car will have a V5 which identifies the car by it's chassis and engine numbers (although the latter may not be the original engine) and establishes the registration number it has or had and shows ownership, past or present up to date of lapse. With or without the original document registration must still be applied for to make the vehicle road legal and confirm an original number plate if still on the car or otherwise known.

Lapsed, unclaimed or unregistered numbers are frequently sold by the DVLA and old, short number plates like mine are particularly sought after, called by the DVLA Cherished Numbers. The first step therefore is to establish if the known registration number is still available by consulting the DVLA web site.

The process of registration either confirms the original number or if unavailable a new, age related number is issued with a V5 by the DVLA.

The vehicle identification requirements must be confirmed by an authorised person, usually an officer of a recognised club who must inspect the vehicle, view the engine and chassis number and identify the type or model and colours. The club is permitted to make a small charge for this service.

The vehicle must be presented in ostensibly road-ready condition so a half-built project will not qualify but no road trial is required. For the purpose of registration the DVLA is not interested in insurance or MOT.

Then comes the trickiest part. There is a form to be filled in, much of which does not apply to an old vehicle but the answers must be carefully chosen. In my case, our secretary, David was of the most necessary help in completing this form. Without his help I doubt I would have succeeded.

My number, PG400 being a 2-letter, 3 digit number is apparently particularly desirable so to my great relief we were surprised to find it had not been sold off by the DVLA and of course I still had my original buff, fold-out registration document - even a few tax discs.

I then submitted this form to the DVLA with all its correct answers, a declaration by David as authorised officer of the club, photos of the registration document, chassis and engine numbers and photos of the car and stood by in eager anticipation. The answer came from the DVLA in only a couple of weeks with the much valued V5.

I must stress that this is only my personal experience and anyone wishing to reinstate or reclaim registration should not rely on my experience and would be well advised to study the DVLA web site advice. Good luck.

Mysteries of the Seven

I bought my 1929 Chummy 52 years ago and drove several thousand miles before life got in the way, I put her on blocks, covered with a sheet and ignored her for 20 years.

6 months ago with time and funds available it seemed to be the right time to give the old thing a well-deserved refit before recommissioning. So carb and distributer off, stripped and cleaned, new battery, fresh petrol and I drove her out of the garage, 1/4 mile down the drive and back and she ran as smoothly as ever, even the brakes worked. Would a modern car do the same?

She has the usual electrolytic deterioration of the aluminium/steel floor pan lip but not significant enough to warrant immediate attention so body-off work can wait for another time. This time work has been limited to dismantling the brakes, new lever pivots, new backing plates (which always rust), new shoes, springs and cables, shock absorbers front and rear refitted, (front only requiring new rubber bushes which make a big difference), new interior door and back seat panels and linings, shot blasting wheels and epoxy spraying thanks to the eccentric Steve Rocket near Avonwick and new tyres fitted.

If it ain't broke don't touch it - a good motto but, perhaps stupidly, one I ignored, so the scary rats' nest of wiring lurking behind the dashboard all came out and the fortunately simple wiring circuits replaced.

Like so many Sevens she had a slow drip from somewhere under the engine. When close examination showed the source to be the clutch bell-housing the reason was obvious - main crank oil seal worn. As many will know, lifting the engine out of a Chummy is a fairly simple job, mainly requiring a wriggle underneath and a pair of strong arms - stand by the son! Removing the gearbox confirmed the suspect oil seal located on the back of the crankcase and behind the flywheel.

A7 flywheels are notoriously difficult to remove, often never been touched for a life-time. Our chairman David kindly lent me the recommended tool, a simple 3" bit of flat bar, drilled and threaded for a bolt in the middle with holes either end for loose bolts. A threaded hole in the flywheel either side of the tapered crankshaft stub allows the loose bolts to be screwed into the flywheel. Now just wind up the middle bolt into the crankshaft stub, give the thing a smart whack and the theory is that it jumps off. David's advice was to heat the flywheel with a hot air gun to assist release. The problem was that the 2 bolts could not be made to engage in the holes. I was about to drive over to the marvelous Tracy Tools in Torquay to find a suitable tap but could not resist one more go. This time I gave the flywheel around the crankshaft stub good few minutes roasting with my mini blow lamp and to my amazement the thing did indeed succumb to the first strike - with a copper mallet of course. Thanks David for your help and advice.

The original oil seal is the usual Austin felt ring seal which has 2 issues. Firstly it becomes sodden with oil which after extended layup hardens and looses it's sealing qualities. Secondly, the flywheel boss on which the seal runs is inevitably worn effectively preventing a seal.

The answer is a modern neoprene seal obtainable from any reputable supplier. However if not running on a perfectly smooth surface it will have a short life.

The solution for a worn boss is to fit an SKF Speedi Seal - other makes available - but having measured the wear to be minimal I decided to turn the boss smooth. Phil at Riverside Engineering, Dartmouth machined a couple of thou off in minutes. That man can do anything with steel.

It is worth noting that the early cars had a smaller diameter boss than the post 1932 (I think right date) so be sure to order the right seal.

Also, the replacement aluminium plate carrying the seal is made for the later cars so requires the inner flanges turning down a fraction to fit into the crankcase.

The next issue is worn pivot pins in the clutch disengage fingers. I found excessive wear on the pins with negligeable wear on the fingers and pillars but surprisingly the pins are unavailable - more of this anon. Making a simple tool to rivet on the new linings is better than whacking them at an angle. Refitting the gearbox and dropping the engine back in is simple enough but will require that pair of strong arms again and another wiggle underneath. Easily said but, of course, it does take longer than ever anticipated but with a Seven the rewards are worth the effort.




